

Attached are two photos taken on February 14, 2007. One is David Botts standing next to a moving stream (water is moving downhill toward the top of the photo) that is in the area on the sketch marked "wetland." Keep in mind that by designating this stream as "wetland," no stream buffer is required. Stream buffers are only required for those things designated on the sketch as "streams." In other words, the watershed protection ordinance requires buffers for streams, but makes no mention of wetlands. Rather than calling this area a "wetland," which allows the area to escape the buffer requirement, this water area would appear, by most reasonable people with an onsite inspection, to be a stream and, therefore, require a vegetative buffer. On Feb. 14, 2007, this stream where David is standing has more moving water than the southern stream indicated on the sketch

The other photo (Betsy's leg), is about 20 feet from the east boundary of Larkspur, upstream from the photo of David and stream. The water here was moving downhill toward David, which moved downhill toward the West boudnary. (Look to the top of the photo of Betsy's sandal and you will see the reflection of the water moving downhill. The water

where Betsy is standing is not indicated on the skecth as anything, neither stream nor wetland.)
