## Children's Hearth Site Plan Narrative

The site for the proposed Children's Hearth Daycare is an existing residence with an established landscape that requires no site disturbing activities. The site is less than 20,000 squate feet.

According to the Chatham County Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance, Section 10, no plan is required for activities involving less than 20,000 square feet.

A conversation with Dan LaMontagne , Director of the Chatham Co. Environmental Quality Dept., confirmed this.

The installation of shrubbery and trees and the planting buffer is the only site activity left to do which is covered under routine horticultural landscape practices. This would include planting and imnnediate mulching of landscaped areas.

The site has an exiscing gravel driveway and parking area capable of holding 5 cars in $10 \times 18$ foot spaces with additional capacity to enter and leave the site.

There is a natural buffer of large mixed trees, shrubs and large boulders on the border of Bingo St. which would prevent any motorized vehicles from accessing the playground. Being a dirt and gravel road, it is naturally necessary to drive slowly.

There are no residences visible from the site. The site is surrounded by woodlands. There are several large, mature oaks, pines and other hardwoods on site and in play areas.

The playground is located behind the residence. There is an existing play structure, a gravel trike path, and a sand play area.

3. Choices of activities conducive to their particular levels of interest and ability; and
4. Professionally trained people who understand the complex and special ways small children develop and grow who also are committed to staying with them for several years before kindergarten."

## Competition

There are twelve (12) competing child care centers in the northeast section of Chatham County.

Children's Hearth Property is located in a residential community with children of working families who would have need of the Children's Hearth facility. The property Owner maintains a respected and social relationship with the community.

If you are not qualified, you must immediately stop providing child care in accordance with child care rules 10A NCAC 09 .2701(e), .2701(h), and $.2702(\mathrm{~g})$. You may not own, operate, be employed, provide transportation, or work in a child are facility, or be present when children are in care. If you are a nonlicensed home provider or a transportation only provider, your enrollment in the subsidized child care program will be terminated by the local purchasing agency in accordance with Child Care Rule 10A NCAC $09.2704(\mathrm{~h})$. If you live in a home where child care is provided, this disqualification requires that you not be present when children are in care; that child care no longer be provided in the home; or that the provider's enrollment in the subsidized child care program be terminated. If you wish to challenge this disqualification, you must file a civil lawsuit in the district court in the county where you live within 60 days after receiving the written notification of disqualification. You may obtain information about filing in district court from the clerk of court's office at the county courthouse. You may wish to consult an attorney as to whether you should contest the disqualification. If you think the information contained in the SBI or FBI record is wrong, you must write to the SBI directly. The SBI will inform you of how to obtain a copy of your record and how to challenge the accuracy or completeness of that record. # Sick Child Policy for The Children's Hearth Home Center 

2012

## Health Status of the Child

Children enrolled in our program must meet certain health requirements. In order for us to ensure that children meet these requirements, parents must complete a Medical Form for their child within 30 days of the child's date of enrollment. Completion of this Medical Form requires a health status assessment conducted by: (1) a licensed physician, (2) a physician's authorized agent who is currently approved by the North Carolina Medical board or by a comparable certifying board in any state contiguous to North Carolina, (3) a certified nurse practitioner, or (4) a public health nurse who meets the Department's Standards for the Eary Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment Program. The Medical Form must be singed and dated by one of the above health practitioners and must also contain the child's vaccination history.

Children with known medical or developmental problems or conditions that might require special care in an emergency (asthma, allergies, seizures, etc) will have a special care plan. Copies will be kept in the child's file and in a special care plan notebook, kept at the First Aid Station in our office.

## Emergency Procedure

If a child requires emergency first aid (for example, if a problem arises due to food intake, accidents, or unusual behavior, dental), a staff person will take appropriate action to alleviate the problem until professional care can be rendered. We will notify parent as soon as possible. If we determine that a child needs emergency medical attention, we will call an ambulance. If the emergency Medical Technician at the scene advises us that a child needs to be taken to a hospital emergency room, a staff member will accompany child in the ambulance, and they will be taken to Memorial Hospital. If parent chooses to take child to a private doctor following a (non-emergency)health event, they must come directly to the center to pick child up. An Incident Report will be completed by the teacher, signed by the parent, and submitted to the Licensing Consultant within 48 hours after the incident had occurred. When bringing child back to the center, parents are requested to let child's teacher know the outcome of the doctor visit and what their child's health status is. While in care, children sometimes develop fevers rather suddenly. Parents may authorize us to administer a one time dose of Tylenol or other fever-reducing medication by completing a "blanket" medication form for this purpose.

## Illness and Communicable Diseases

Despite the best efforts of both parents and staff at the center to keep children healthy, children inevitably become ill. Young children, in particular, get sick more often because: 1) their immune systems do not fight illnesses as well as the immune systems of adults; 2) they have not previously been exposed to many
of the germs (viruses, bacteria, fungi, or parasites) that cause infection and therefore have not built up defenses against these germs; 3) they learn about and explore their environments with their hands and mouths; 4) they and their classmates have not yet learned to control their secretions and excretions, which are carriers of infectious germs; 5) they catch contagious diseases from other classmates, often ones who do not look or feel sick but who are nevertheless capable of transmitting illnesses.

Maintaining health and preventing the spread of contagious illnesses are responsibilities shared by parents and child care providers. We have clear policies for managing and preventing illnesses. We train our staff in illness-prevention practices designed to limit the spread of infections. We follow the recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics and the United States Public Health Service in requiring parents to have their children immunized again the following major diseases: diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, Haemophilus influenza type B disease, poliomyelitis, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis B, and for children born after April, 2001 chicken pox (requests for exemptions for religious and medical reasons are considered on a case-by-case basis).

In addition to vaccinations, we also try to prevent illness through our behaviors. The single most effective way to limit the spread of infection is by frequent hand washing. We require that staff, and request that parents and children wash their hands thoroughly when entering and before leaving the center. Staff and children wash their hands numerous times throughout the day, including after each "dirty situation" (changing diapers, helping with toileting, wiping noses, handling toys that have been in children's mouths, etc.) We teach children to wash their hands with soap continuously for 15 seconds so that cleaning is adequate, and we supervise children to ensure that these procedures are followed. Our staff follows the same procedures. We encourage parents to reinforce their children's learning by modeling and rewarding frequent and proper hand-washing at home as well.

When illnesses do occur, we rely on our established procedures for handling and reporting illness exposures, identifying an ill child, and communicating with parents about these and related matters. If a child is too ill to wait for pick up in the classroom, they will be cared for in the sick room until the parents arrive to take them home. Parents are responsible for providing up-to-date emergency phone numbers, promptly picking up their ill children, and consulting with the appropriate health care providers and diagnosis and care. The teacher/director must be notified if a child or any other member of the household has contracted a contagious disease. Upon notification, we will post a sign on the public bulletin board in the downstairs playroom by the door, notifying parents of possible exposure and of the disease in question (of course, without identifying the individual or family).

The policies regarding communicable diseases and attendance at the center also apply to the staff and volunteers.

## Recognizing Signs of IIIness in Children

Childcare staff and parents learn to recognize the signs and symptoms of illness in the children under their care. Fever, which may be a symptom of contagious or serious illness, is often used by parents and childcare providers to identify a child who may be ill. The child's physical appearance and behavior provide additional signs. Examples of such signs include: unusual drowsiness or fussiness, persistent or
excessive crying, wheezing, uncontrollable coughing, breathing difficulty, food or liquid intolerance, refusal to play, and complaints of pain. If we perceive these symptoms in children in our care at the center, we will ask parents to get their children checked by a physician.

## When a Child Should be Kept or Taken Home

If a child is ill, he or she cannot remain at the center. We do not provide sick child care. If a child has a fever, they should be excluded from the childcare setting until the symptoms of illness have disappeared. Children should not be brought to the center if they have any of the following symptoms in the previous 24 hours: fever, (defined as a temperature of 100 degrees or more), extreme behavior changes; diarrhea; vomiting; mouth sores with drooling; rash with fever or behavior change; moist skin lesion; pink eye with white or yellow eye discharge; (until 24 hours after treatment has started); scabies, head lice or other infestation (that have been treated and only if child is nit free). Children must be free of symptomswithout medication for 24 hours before returning to center. Some contagious diseases require specific management before a child can return to a group care setting, as specified in state child care regulations. If a child wears diapers and has two incidents of diarrhea or any instance of diarrhea that leaks from the diaper, he or she may not remain at the center.

Children who are feeing ill are fussy, difficult to console, and want (and need) to be held and pampered and should be cared for at home. Unfortunately, we do not have enough staff to provide this level of care for ill children. Unlike adults, who have the coping skills to function outside the home even when sick, children who are ill have great difficulty dealing with group settings, sharing toys and space, and cooperating with others. Children who have coping difficulties or behavior problems when healthy are particularly difficult to manage when they are ill. Unlike adults, children who are ill do not modify their own behavior by taking it easy. Last, sick children put shared toys in their mouths and engage in other play that put healthy children at risk for illness. For all these reasons, if a child is not feeling well, they should not be brought to The Children's Hearth Home Center. If a child develops these symptoms while at the center, parental arrangements to remove the child as soon as possible will be required.

When the child has recovered enough to cope, play, and enjoy a stimulating and active small group setting, parents may bring him or her back to the center.

When a child shows serious signs of illness, the decision to keep him or her home is normally an easy one for the parent. When a child has ambiguous or unclear symptoms or has signs of mild illness, the decision may be more difficult due to competing priorities. If a parent brings a child to the center and our staff perceives that the child is too ill to be there, the director or her designate may request that you come to the preschool and retrieve the child. The director or designate has the final authority to exclude a child from the childcare setting due to illness.

## Arranging Alternate Care

Young children typically experience 8-12 upper respiratory infections a year in addition to other illnesses. When a child is enrolled in our center, parents must make a plan for caring for their children when they are ill. There must also be a plan in place for being able to retrieve children from care on short notice if a child develops signs of illness while at the center. The center must ALWAYS be able to contact a parent. Current contact information numbers must be present and accessible in each child's file kept in the office.

## Medication

Our staff will administer prescription or over -the-counter medication to a child if the child's parent completes and signs a Medication Form. These forms are available in our office. On this form parents must indicate the child's name, the name of the medication, dosage, and dates and times to be given. The form must be completed for each week the medicine is to be administered. A written statement from the parent may give blanket permission for up to one year to authorize administration of sunscreen and diapering creams. A written statement from a parent may give blanket permission for up to six months to authorize administration of medication for asthma, and allergic reactions. The Medication Form is given to the teacher/director in charge of all medications at The Children's Hearth Home Center. Medicines are stored either in refrigerated or non-refrigerated locked boxes, depending on the medication's storage requirements. Medications, whether prescribed or over-the-counter, must be brought to the center in their original containers. Special treatment for diaper rash, sunburn, itching, insect repellents, etc. , must also be kept in the locked box, as they are considered hazardous by state law. Hand lotion and chap stick must also be kept in the locked box. We have two locked boxes. One is for the refrigerator and the other is in our office.
