

Protest Goes On; Arrest Reported

[*Integration leader visits Durham. Front Page.*]

HIGH POINT, Feb. 16 — An additional arrest was made this afternoon in connection with this city's race troubles which started last week when Negro high school students started demonstrating against segregated food service.

Jerry Clayton Sanders, Negro, 21, of 513 Grayson St., has been charged with blocking a sidewalk and refusing to move on when instructed to do so by police officers.

Sanders was arrested as police attempted to clear around 500 Negroes and white people—most of them of school age—from Wrenn Street bridge about 4:30 p.m.

As early as 3 p.m. today white students and some white adults began congregating in front of Woolworth's downtown store where the first food counter demonstration was held last week and where most of the trouble has centered since. Around 3:45 p.m. a large group of Negroes walked through several variety stores, including Woolworth's.

They were followed by the whites and there was much jeering on both sides.
