In fact, they are anti-anything which jars them in their cocoons of bigoted supremacy. They do well to quote and misquote their little-understood mythology, for the fanatics who embrace this doctrine have for 2,000 years been responsible, by means of religious war, crusade, inquisition, enslavement, forced conversion, burning and missionary invasion, for more misery and suffering than any other plague. Today, in Africa, in Germany, in the United States, they continue to perpetrate intolerance while denying the meaning and intent of Jesus' teachings of the brotherhood of man, crying for blood while crying upon the blood of the Lamb.
