In a surprise move, the 45 col-lege students involved in down-town sitdown lunch counter agi-tation asked for a jury trial yesterday in Municipal - County Court.

Judge Hampton Howerton granted the request of Kenneth Lee, attorney for the group, and ordered the 45 students to post \$25 bonds for appearance in Guilford Superior Court for the June 13 term.

The students, including two white girls, were arrested on trespass charges at the S. H. Kress and Co. South Elm Street lunch counter April 21 after the store manager had warned them they would be arrested if they took seats at the counter.

Ask Jury Trial

Lee made the motion for jury trial shortly after court opened, and the matter was handled within a few minutes. The courtroom was c r o w d e d, and the crowd contained a number of Greensboro Negro professional men.
