

# Sit-In Bills Of Indictment For Grand Jury Delayed

Presentation of bills of indictment charging 45 students with trespassing in connection with the recent sit-in demonstrations has been delayed to a later session of the Guilford Grand Jury, it was announced today.

The bills, charging 43 Negro students at A&T and Bennett Colleges and two white girls, students at Bennett, with trespassing at S. H. Kress & Co. here April 21, were originally scheduled to be considered by the grand jury this morning as it met in connection with the opening of a two-week criminal term of Guilford Superior Court. Solicitor Horace R. Kornegay announced the indictments will be considered at a later session.

The grand jury was expected to return decisions on some 30 other bills of indictment early this afternoon.

In the criminal court, with Judge L. Richardson Preyer presiding, jury deliberations began late this morning in a case in which Donald C. Fuller, 26-year-old Fayetteville Negro, is plead-

ing innocent to a charge of speeding 34 miles an hour in a 20-mile zone.

Eight divorce actions were scheduled for trial in civil division of the court at 2 p.m. today, where a two-week session opened this morning. Judge Allen H. Gwyn of Reidsville heard motions in other cases during the morning.

Judge Gwyn announced today court will adjourn Wednesday of this week in order that attorneys may attend the North Carolina Bar Assn. meeting.

Four cases scheduled for trial this week have been continued to later terms of court. They include a suit seeking \$1,000 for theater prize, brought by W. O. Wiley against Standard Amusement Co. Inc.; a car ownership dispute brought by D. D. Wyrick against J. J. Dean, a \$35,000 personal injury action brought by Charles B. Willis against Edward Opal Roberts, and a suit brought by Clara C. Redden against Marvin Thomas Bynum and Universal Auto Rentals Inc.
