SUBJECT:

Consideration of Parking and Public Improvements Commission

Recommendation to Approve a New Painted Crosswalk at Highland

Avenue and 7th Street.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council pass a motion to approve the Parking and Public Improvements Commission recommendation to install a pedestrian crosswalk with high visibility markings and pedestrian warning signs on the north leg of Highland Avenue at 7th Street.

FISCAL IMPLICATION:

The recommended modifications can be accomplished through existing Public Works programs and budgets.

BACKGROUND:

In May 2007, the City received a petition from Mr. Jeff Tarango, a resident on 6th Place for a painted crosswalk at the intersection of Highland Avenue and 7th Street. The petition states that a marked crosswalk would provide safer access for residents and their children when walking to and from the beach.

DISCUSSION:

As described in the attached report, the Traffic Engineer supports the installation of a marked crosswalk across Highland Avenue at 7th Street. The traffic and pedestrian volumes, absence of collision history, and skewed points of pedestrian access justify the need to enhance pedestrian safety and provide positive guidance between the sidewalks on the east side and the walk street on the west side. There are similar marked crosswalks on Highland Avenue at the north legs of 8th Street, 9th Street, 10th Street and 11th Street. The Traffic Engineer recommended that the north leg of the intersection is the most appropriate location because this alignment has the best visibility and would be consistent with several other marked crosswalks to the north.

PPIC Review

1. Petition Request for Painted Crosswalk on Highland Avenue at 7th Street

Traffic Engineer Zandvliet presented staff's report and recommendation to approve the request for a marked crosswalk with crosswalk warning signs on Highland Avenue at 7th Street on the north leg.

Audience Participation

Marti Padilla, 600 Block of Highland Avenue, voiced her support for the crosswalk and expressed kudos to the neighbors who took the time to make this request. She talked of the fast pace of traffic on Highland Avenue and asked that the speed trailer and increased police enforcement be designated to the area.

Discussion

Commissioner Donahue stated his support of the crosswalk.

Commissioner Gross relayed his support, sharing that the greatest benefit is that it will provide a safer access for children.

Commissioner Stabile conveyed his support of the crosswalk, noting the sound reasons put forth in the petition along with absence of any opposition.

Chairperson Paralusz noted her agreement with staff's recommendations for the crosswalk, and applauded the petitioner for participating in the process and bringing this issue to the City's attention.

A motion was MADE and SECONDED (Gross/Stabile) to approve the request for a marked crosswalk with crosswalk warning signs on Highland Avenue at 7th Street on the north leg, as recommended by staff.

SUBJECT:

Request for Painted Crosswalk - Highland Avenue at 7th Street

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Commission approve the request for a marked crosswalk with crosswalk warning signs on Highland Avenue at 7th Street on the north leg.

BACKGROUND:

In May 2007, Mr. Jeff Tarango, a resident on 6th Place, submitted a petition from 26 nearby residents to paint a crosswalk across Highland Avenue at 7th Street. The petition states that a marked crosswalk would provide safer access for residents and their children when walking to and from the beach.

DISCUSSION:

The California Vehicle Code Section 275 defines a crosswalk as:

- 1. That portion of a roadway included within the prolongation or connection of the boundary lines of sidewalks at (an) intersection where the intersecting roadways meet at approximately right angles, except the prolongation of such lines from an alley across a street.
- 2. Any portion of a roadway distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surface.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, there shall not be a crosswalk where local authorities have placed signs indicating no crossing.

The primary purpose of a painted crosswalk is to encourage pedestrians to cross at the optimum location by providing positive guidance and control and/or where a recommended crossing may not be obvious to the pedestrian.

It is typically advised that pedestrians cross at controlled crossings, especially in business districts. Uncontrolled crossing locations are generally better served by <u>not</u> marking crosswalks so that pedestrians are encouraged to use the signalized or walk street crosswalks or use more caution when crossing the street at an unmarked location.

Highland Avenue is a collector street that serves as the primary access for both residents and commercial businesses within the Strand and downtown neighborhoods. Highland Avenue carries approximately 7,500 vehicles per day near the subject area. The area has high pedestrian usage, particularly during the summer months. There are several painted crosswalks, both controlled and uncontrolled, across Highland Avenue in this area. The land use both north and south of the study area is mainly residential multi-family.

The intersection of Highland Avenue and 7th Street is a "tee" type intersection with a stop sign on the east approach of 7th Street only. 7th Street is a one-block long vehicular street between Highland Avenue and Crest Drive to the east. 7th Street is a walk street to the east of Crest Drive and west of Highland Drive. There are marked crosswalks on the north leg of 8th Street, 9th Street, 10th Street and 11th Street. There are no marked crosswalks on Highland Avenue to the south between 7th Street and 5th Street, which is a four-way stop intersection without marked crosswalks.

The traffic collision history between January 1, 2001 and September 30, 2004 was analyzed for Highland Avenue near 7th Street. There have been no pedestrian or vehicular collisions at or near the intersection in the 3-3/4 year period.

Pedestrian counts were taken on Wednesday, June 13, 2007, during a typical weekday. The results are summarized in the following table:

It is generally acknowledged that pedestrian crossing volumes at all crossing locations on Highland Avenue are significantly higher in the peak summer months. The pedestrian counts indicate that many pedestrians do not cross at the intersection, but rather cross at random locations on either side of the intersection. The volumes represent a moderate level of pedestrian activity that is similar to most walk street crossing locations along Highland Avenue in this area.

Pedestrians are generally encouraged to use the walk streets where possible since there is less conflict with vehicles, and walk streets connect directly to The Strand. Marked crosswalks provide both positive guidance between walk street segments and raise driver awareness to locations with higher pedestrian concentrations. While it is legal to cross at 7th Street pursuant to the Vehicle Code, it may not readily apparent to the pedestrian which path to take between the dual sidewalks on either side of 7th Street and the single walk street located in the center of the intersection. Since there are several possible routes, a marked crosswalk would identify a single path with the best and safest crossing conditions. There are already existing crosswalks on 7th Street at Manhattan Avenue and Ocean Drive that connect to the beach.

Based on the above conditions, the Traffic Engineer believes a marked crosswalk on Highland Avenue at 7th Street would enhance pedestrian safety and provide positive guidance between the

sidewalks and walk street. The north leg would be the most appropriate location for a marked crosswalk because this leg has the best visibility and it would be consistent with the marked crosswalks to the north.

CONCLUSION:

Based on the above analysis, a marked crosswalk with crosswalk warning signs on the north leg of Highland Avenue at 7th Street is recommended.




