RE: Lake Lucille Outlet Control

Your attention is invited to the enclosed proposed transfer of responsibility and authority from the Department of Fish and Game. The agreement would provide the City with \$25,000 to repair or design an improved weir for the Lake Lucille outlet. Acceptance of the agreement would also transfer responsibility for maintenance of the outlet structure, thus the responsibility for the lake water level, to the City.

We know that the \$25,000 is inadequate for any major repair or improvements to the structure. The amount may fund a design of a new structure but any construction would require permitting efforts through various state and federal agencies and costs approaching \$250,000.

It appears that the Department of Natural Resources has primary responsibility for the condition and management The department may be in a better position than Lake Lucille. the City to acquire resources and coordinate agency efforts to properly manage the lake water levels and conditions. The City should continue efforts to demonstrate the extent of the lake water quality problems and to encourage state agencies to take corrective are within actions that their realm responsibility.

The City must consider many factors in deciding to accept all or part of the responsibility for Lake Management and the weir re-construction. I have roughed out a chart listing some of the issues and consequences. It is attached for your use.

The City may sponsor the project, and in so doing provide water level control to reduce weed growth and satisfy concerns of Lake residents.

If the State Division of sport Fish alone repairs the weir, the project will likely involve simple reinforcement of the existing structure.

I recommend that the question be discussed by Council and direction given to work toward a later decision on the project.

We currently have \$25,000 available for the repair or replacement of the Lake Lucille outlet control structure. These funds are from the Governor's Jobs Bill (HB 512) that was passed by the legislature in 1988.

The outlet control structure was originally built to stabilize the water depth in Lake Lucille so that the lake would support a fish stocking program. At that time, there were few people living around the lake shore and the primary concern was fish enhancement. Now that many houses have been built around the lake, it appears that the structure primarily serves to enhance the aesthetics of the lake. Recent water quality studies on the lake indicate that it should be partially drained during the winter to control aquatic vegetation.

In requesting \$25,000 for this project, we had envisioned making only minor repairs that would be necessary to continue using the control structure for the stocking program. Completely rebuilding the structure to incorporate a lake level control gate and possibly a fish ladder will be more costly than the funds available, and can not be justified solely on the basis of fish stocking. We also feel that it is beyond this department's authority to request additional funds for work that is not directly related to the sport fishery in the lake.

At this time, we would prefer to have the City of Wasilla directly involved in determining the future of the Lake Lucille control structure. Initially, we can transfer the \$25,000 to the City and these funds can be used to either repair the existing structure, or design a new one. We can also assist the City in requesting additional state funds to construct a new structure. Ultimately, we would like to transfer responsibility for the structure and its maintenance to the City.

Enclosed is a draft of a cooperative agreement that outlines our respective responsibilities in this project. Please review this agreement and let us know how you wish to proceed. Should you have any questions, please call Tom Donek at 465-4180; he will be able to assist you.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF WASILLA AND ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME FOR RECONSTRUCTION OF LAKE LUCILE OUTLET CONTROL STRUCTURE

This cooperative agreement is made and entered into between the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, Division of Sport Fish, P.O. Box 3-2000, Juneau, Alaska 99802-2000, hereinafter referred to as the Department, and the City of Wasilla, 290 Herning Ave., Wasilla, Alaska 99687, hereinafter referred to as the City.

I. Purpose of the agreement:

To reconstruct the outlet control structure on Lake Lucile and to transfer ownership of the structure from the Department of Fish and Game to the City of Wasilla.

II. Covenants of the State:

The Department hereby agrees:

- 1. To contribute funds for the purpose of this agreement from the Governor's Jobs Bill (HB 512). The amount of these funds shall be \$25,000. Transfer of these funds to the City shall occur within sixty days after final signature of this agreement.
- 2. To assist the City in obtaining additional funds that may be necessary to complete the work.

III. Covenant of the City:

The City does hereby agree:

- 1. To perform all work necessary to either repair the existing outlet control structure or replace it with a new structure. The work may be performed by consultants, contractors or other third parties acting under the supervision of the City.
- 2. To assume ownership (including operation and maintenance) of the Lake Lucile outlet control structure after it has been reconstructed.
- 3. To indemnify, save the state harmless, and defend the Department, its agents, and its employees from any and all claims or actions for injuries or damages sustained by any person or property arising directly or indirectly during

construction or from the City's performance of this agreement. However, this provision has no effect if, but only if, the sole proximate cause of the injury or damage is the Department's negligence.

4. To make a good faith effort to comply with the legislative intent contained in HB512, a copy of which is shown in Attachment A.

IV. It is mutually agreed that:


- 1. The effective date of this agreement shall be from the date of final signature by the Commissioner of the Department of Fish and Game.
- 2. This agreement shall remain in effect until the project is completed or until October 30, 1992, whichever is shorter, or may be extended, by mutual written agreement between the Department and the City until construction is completed and ownership is transferred to the City. Either party may terminate this agreement by written notice to the other party at least 90 days in advance of the date on which termination is to become effective. In the event this agreement is terminated, the City shall provide an accounting of all expended funds and shall return all unexpended project funds to the department.
- 3. To comply with AS 35.10.025, which requires construction in accordance with applicable local building codes including the obtaining of required permits and licenses.
- 4. To comply with AS 41.35.070, which requires construction to halt if any archeological remains are uncovered.
- 5. To comply with AS 46.17, The Alaska Dam Safety Act.
- 6. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as obligating the Department or the City to expenditure of funds in excess of those herein agreed upon or authorized by law.
- 7. Nothing in this agreement transfers title or land jurisdiction other than set forth herein.
- 8. No elected or appointed official, shall be admitted to any share or part of the agreement or to any benefit that may arise therefrom.
- 9. That the Department may modify this agreement to meet revised requirements for state or federal law, provided that the modifications to those requirements shall not cause the City financial loss.
- 10. All agents and/or employees of the City shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the Department in performance of this agreement.

11. Each party shall send all written notices required by this agreement by Registered or Certified Mail to:

- 12. Each party will comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and executive orders relative to Equal Employment Opportunity.
- 13. Nothing herein is intended to conflict with federal, state, or local laws or regulations. If there are conflicts, this agreement will be amended at the first opportunity to bring it into conformance with conflicting laws or regulations.
- 14. Policy and position announcements relating specifically to this cooperative program may be made only by mutual consent of the agencies.
- 15. This agreement is complete and has no other encumbrances, addendum, attachments, or amendments with the following exceptions:
