SUMMARY:

At the last council meeting the Wasilla City Council directed administration to move forward with the Sports Complex idea.

In order to allow administration to move forward with bringing a bond issue to a vote of the people, it is first necessary to plan what we intend to build, decide how much it will cost and figure out where it will be located. This requires time and effort on someone's behalf to put together a package that can be brought forward and decided on by the residents of Wasilla.

The Mat-Su Borough has expressed an interest in this facility and we are requesting that they fund half of the anticipated cost to put this package together.



Using the old formula, 2000 would have recorded \$70.8 million in economic impact, ACVB reported. In 1999 total economic impact from conventions was \$51.4 million, down from \$59.1 million in 1998.

In 2000 ACVB serviced a total of 778 conventions, compared with 492 in 1999 and 472 in 1998.

One important annual event and the city's largest convention is the Alaska Federation of Natives meeting in October, he said.

"The state market continues to be our No. 1 source for conventions in Anchorage," said Neumann, owner of Grizzly's Inc., a downtown retailer.

Competition for state meetings is on the rise due to an increase in hotel beds, he said. For example, this summer 362 new hotel rooms are due to come on line.

ACVB also books conventions for upcoming years, and in 2000 ACVB booked conventions totaling an estimated \$70.3 million in economic impact using the new formula.

Using the previous formula for deriving economic impact of conventions, 2000 would have registered a \$60.1 million economic impact compared to \$70.2 million in 1999.

ACVB also tallied a high intourism sales for 2000, Neumann said. In 2000 tourism sales were \$80.6 million, up from \$77.1 million in 1999. However, tourism sales includes only visitor business tracked by ACVB and not the total impact of leisure visitors to Anchorage, he said.

Membership at the marketing organization reached 1,394

last year, up from 1,384 in 1999. Anchorage tourism this year should be buoyed by current hotel renovations, as well as the upcoming Special Olympics World Winter Games March 4-11.

"The opening ceremonies of the Special Olympics World Winter Games provides an opportunity to showcase Anchorage to a watching world as athletes, coaches, family and friends head to Anchorage, Alaska, for the largest event that has ever been hosted by our city," Neumann said.

ACVB officials also listed the group's goals for 2001, which include increasing tourism and convention revenue, and marketing the city as a year-round visitor destination. The group also aims to boost the community's awareness of the benefits of the visitor industry.

In addition, a community survey was conducted to gauge community support for this project. Based on input from meetings, established guidelines for public library planning and survey tabulation, a conceptual design was presented in the fall of 1997. The library task force is in the process of reviewing library options.

- 4. Road Upgrade/Paving Grant Match Additional funds contributed to this program should be considered. We believe major collector streets such as Spuce Avenue should receive a larger grant match (\$50,000.00 per mile is a small proportion of the cost to engineer and pave the roads).
- Borough-wide Community Water Resource Protection Program
 We request that the borough nominate this project, develop scope, and request sufficient funding to assure protection our community water systems, such as lakes, rivers and streams.

ittended an organizational meeting last night with 13 representatives of some of the different youth ganizations that are realizing they are duplicating services, they're individually renting space for eir offices, equipment, volunteer personnel. etc., and that they could better coordinate their efforts neluding their fundraising efforts) and resources by sharing space and resources. These youth ganization officials represent a portion of the <u>thousands</u> of Valley youth sports participants. (Valley occer groups alone attract approximately 2,600 participants, the Youth Football program has 900 enail recipients, Little League has hundreds of players on its roster, etc.)

he conclusion at last night's meeting was that we will continue to meet (City Council chambers will e used for some of the larger meetings) and other youth-oriented groups, such as 4-H, Boys and sirls Scouting groups, less "visible" groups that may include swim and gymnastics clubs, etc., will be noce aged to join the effort to work together for a better product for the community:

Also concluded was the need for <u>action</u> on the multi-use sports facility that has been liscussed, studied, analyzed, proposed, etc. for at least the last 20 years here in the Valley. I have various sports complex surveys, designs, feasibility studies, scoping notes, etc. which date back to 1981 that show that our community has a need for such a complex.

have had many conversations with the Borough Mayor, Palmer Mayor, Rep. Vic Kohring, private developers (including Howard Nugent, who supports us moving forward with a multi-use arena, versus him going forward with his single-use (ice arena) facility), and many, many others regarding this project. As of yet, I have not heard any hesitation from anyone in individuals' support of the city taking the lead with this project to see it come to fruition.

Our Parks and Rec Commission voted unanimously at our last meeting to support the city of Wasilla moving forward in support of a complex.

The concept for this facility includes: combining Howdie Nugent's plans for two sheets of indoor ice, with versatile flooring over at least one sheet of ice to allow basketball/volleyball courts, indoor soccer, convention and banquet-type facility, seating for at least 3000 people, etc. The cost would certainly depend on what uses would be accommodated in the facility, an estimate at this time would be around \$6,500,000 to \$11,000,000.

My fiscally conservative philosophy supports this idea as I look at the money that government species on projects, programs, personnel and facilities to "fix" societies ills and I realize that it's become more politically correct and accepted for government to throw money towards "after-the-fact fixes", instead of preventative measures that a community could take to support and promote

hy, family-oriented, positive, constructive activities and lifestyles. Lven on the local level we d hundreds of thousands of dollars on our Police Dept., Youth Court, DARE Program, etc. to e as "after-the-fact fixes" for juvenile problems. We are in a position to help prevent the lems that we are now forced to pay to attempt to remedy.

Administration has waited patiently - for over four years now - for either the private sector, or e other public entity, to build that which is requested and supported by area residents. Yet the ey still doesn't have an arena. I believe we will have our arena when the city of Wasilla steps up takes the lead and decides to move forward. We are in the position, with our sales tax revenue, basic infrastructure in place, and with people on board who will give this project 110% effort, to ce this happen.

e voters would ultimately decide whether this project would happen or not.

ere is a tremendous amount of vocal support for this type of project in the Valley and I will be spectfully requesting council consideration of moving forward on formulating a plan and, ultimately, pallot proposition for our voters to decide. Thank you.

I'm writing you in the hopes that I may be able to give you arroutside perspective of what your proposed multi-use arena may bring to your city. I grew up in Wasilla and most of my family still resides in the area. I moved to Anchorage in the early 90's to take a teaching job and to broaden my cultural and athletic horizons. That's a fancy way of saying, "I moved because I was bored with the limited facilities the Valley had to offer."

Since then, I've coached, managed, and played on many athletic teams at the high school level and beyond. These include mostly hockey, soccer, and football teams. Anchorage is currently enjoying a boom in hockey participation due to the fact that there have been four new sheets of indoor ice constructed in the past 18 months. These rinks are also being used for many figure skating competitions including next months international Special Olympics.

For years I've wondered what was taking the Valley so long to get on the ball and add to its' extremely limited sports and convention facilities. I've heard rumors now and then that somebody was going to build this or that, but nothing ever materializes. I hope you realize that you have an amazing opportunity to contribute to your city (and the entire Valley) by constructing this proposed complex.

It's incredible to me that kids in the Valley have to risk driving all the way to Anchorage to simply attend a hockey practice; let alone a game. I've been to the gun shows at the high schools and seen how overcrowded they are. I've seen football players preparing for playoff games practice in mud and snow. I've seen high school athletes trying to get in shape for track season training in the halls of the high school!

Here's what I would like to see happen. The new complex should contain a central ice rink with seating for at least 3000. There should also be a separate, regulation size practice rink. The main rink should have a removable hardwood court to accommodate major basketball games. There are no indoor tennis facilities in the Valley so I would construct six courts which would be encircled by a six lane running track. Attached to this, I would construct an indoor soccer facility with quality artificial turf. (This could double as a football practice facility when the weather is nasty). Beside the soccer field, you may as well allocate a six foot wide, 120 foot long runway and pit to accommodate long and triples jumps for track and field events.

No one in the State currently has the ability to host an indoor track meet. This alone would draw thousands of visitors to Wasilla (meaning more sales taxes coming in to help pay for all of this). Don't forget about the convention aspect of the complex either.

I can't stress enough the potential you have in front of you. Wasilla is a fairly divided community with nothing central to join it together. This could be the premier facility in the State! What a perfect centerpiece for the Valley. I've told my family that if something like this was actually constructed, I'd move back. I'm sure there are others that feel the same.

Members of the Friends of Wasilla Library have taken a keen interest in the recent actions by Wasilla City Council to pursue the building of a multi-use sports complex. We enthusiastically agree with the rationale offered for this facility, pursuasively articulated by Mayor Palin. However, we would feel even more positive about the action if it was part of a comprehensive plan of services and facility needs, one which defines public library services as a local government's responsibility and describes when and how Wasilla will address library needs as well as ice/sports facility needs.

We hardly wish to squelch the idea of the sports complex, but we wish to take this opportunity to recall for you the history and status of our library facility issues. I have forwarded this same summary to the Frontiersman, with the hopes that it will generate new momentum to address library service and facility needs in a similar way to that of the sports complex.

A short history of the library facility issues:

The City of Wasilla, with the authority of state law, has owned and operated Wasilla's library since 1978. The current library building opened in 1978. With 4,000 square feet it was projected to meet the city's needs for 20 years, through 1998. Population growth, however, exceeded projections. In 1985 the basement was remodeled with State funds, doubling the floor space, but since 1990 the library has been deemed too small. Standard industry guidelines indicated in 1997 that our library at that time should be 16,000 square feet, not including meeting space.

What has been done to address this problem?

 The 1995 Wasilla Comprehensive Plan identified overcrowding and parking and traffic flow problems as severe.

In 1996 the Friends of Wasilla Library, in cooperation with the City Administration, established a community Building Committee, and Architects Alaska was hired by the City to help conduct a needs assessment and conceptual design.

In 1997, under the direction of Mayor Palin, a public opinion survey regarding library needs was distributed to all residents in the library's "service area" (of which then and now includes approximately 80% of non-city residents). Results showed:

- 93% of the respondents felt the library is a basic community service (this included frequent and infrequent or non-users of the library);
- 73% felt Wasilla needed a larger library and expanded resources; the areas needing the

most improvement were parking, book collection, table and seating space, overcrowding, reference collection, electronic resources and audio-video collection.

- The most preferred means of funding a new facility were sales tax (35%), property tax (17%), and "other" (24%);
- The most preferred means of providing operating expenses for the library were sales tax (40%), property tax (14%) and "other" (20%)
- These and many other responses were tabulated and presented to Wasilla City Council in May 1997. Later that year Architects Alaska presented their concept drawings and cost estimates to Council.

In 1998 Wasilla City Council established a Building Options Committee, comprised of Council members, Building Committee representatives, and others, to look at all options for addressing library space needs.

In 1999 this committee reported back to the Council their findings, including the pro's and cons of reducing the costs of a new building, leasing existing space, exploring a build-to-suit

arrangement, securing grants, or doing nothing.

Also in 1999 the City solicited ideas from the Friends concerning what our vision was for Wasilla's library, for purposes of preparing the City Comprehensive Plan. Our vision statement was forwarded to the Planning Department that summer, and included the need for expanded services and a place to provide those services.

Later in 1999 the Friends initiated an effort to bring together elected officials, administration. library staff, and advocates from throughout the borough to look at governance, funding, and planning needs related to libraries in the borough. The outcome of this effort was a general consensus to pursue funding agreements between the cities (Wasilla and Palmer) and the Borough for library services, and to request the Borough Library Board continue to provide leadership for ongoing facility planning and other matters.

In 2000, as part if its regular review process, the Borough Library Board, revised its comprehensive plan and emphasized the need for sound library facility planning, especially given the immediate needs in some areas. The Borough Assembly will be reviewing this

document and, hopefully approving it, in the next few weeks.

That brings us to the present, and explains why we are watching with interest the apparent groundswell of support for the multi-use sports complex. We are heartened by the fact that the City of Wasilla and the Mat-Su Borough administrations are finding some common goals and ways of working together on this project (as they did with the public safety building).

We do NOT wish to debate the relative merits of a library versus a sports complex, or a library versus a public safety building. What we desire is recognition of the value of a strong public library in our community, and serious, sustained attention given to achieving that for the greater Wasilla area.

Attached is a summary of what a strong public library offers our community. We hope we can count on you to help make it a reality.

- 1. It's often the best source of easily available, timely, and affordable information needed for personal, family, and job-related purposes.
- 2. Its collections and services are important adjuncts to our schools and college and are essential to homeschoolers and independent learners of all ages.
- 3. Its children's program helps introduce young children to reading, stimulate young minds, and foster a life-long interest in learning. It is the only library serving children of preschool age. It promotes reading over the summer and at other times when other libraries are closed. (Children who read regularly improve their reading skills better than those who do not.)
- 4. It provides a safe, wholesome place for young people and families. For some youth, reading or working at the library is their alternative to unsafe or delinquent behavior. For many families, regular library visits are ways to nurture family bonds as well as to nurture love of reading and learning.

Multi-Use Sports Complex/Convention Center

A multi-use sports facility has been discussed, studied, analyzed, proposed, etc. for at least 20 years here in the Mat-Su Valley. Studies show our community has a need for such a complex. A population growth rate within the City of Wasilla of 66% over the past 10 years and the growing need for ice time and places for organized sports and functions has pushed our community to a critical stage. Individuals and teams, youths and adults have all expressed the need for more facilities. Currently team spaces are filled to capacity and gym and ice space for games and practices are not available.

A multi-use sports complex would unify the many youth sports organizations and allow the groups to come together under one umbrella to better service the Valley's youth activity needs. Presently youth organizations are duplicating services, individually renting space for their offices, equipment, volunteer personnel, etc. A complex would allow them to better coordinate their efforts (including their fundraising efforts) and resources by sharing space and resources.

Concept for this facility includes: sheets of indoor ice, with versatile flooring over at least one sheet of ice to allow basketball/volleyball courts, indoor soccer, convention and banquet-type facility, seating for at least 3000 people, etc. Local school graduation ceremonies could be held in the Valley. Conferences, concerts and performances needing expanded seating capacities would be accommodated.

A multi-use facility such as this would allow for user fees to remain in the Valley as opposed to Anchorage and surrounding areas where users are now forced to commute. Sales tax revenue would be generated by increased economic activity in the city. Increased tourist/hotel industry revenue would be generated by the use of such a facility. This facility's operations would be contracted out to the private sector in a competitive bid process.

City Of Wasilla Summary Of The Local Economy For The City OF Wasilla

The City of Wasilla is located in the Matanuska-Susitna (Mat-Su) Borough, which is the third largest Borough in the State. The Mat-Su Borough is the fastest growing area in the State of Alaska. The Mat-Su Borough's population has grown by 40 percent over the last 10 years and the City of Wasilla's population has grown by over 66 percent since 1991. Population growth is one of the key economic ingredients for the robust economy in the City of Wasilla.

Through careful planning and investment in the City's infrastructure, the City of Wasilla has developed itself into the retail trade center for the Mat-Su Borough. It is estimated that the City of Wasilla provided services for over 42,400 people in the Mat-Su Borough (approximately 76 percent of the Borough's total population). Traffic counts support this estimate. Based on Alaska Department of Transportation vehicle counts, over 31,615 vehicles traveled through Wasilla per day in 1999. It is estimated that the retail and service expansion will continue to expand at a rapid rate as the City of Wasilla's and the Greater Wasilla area's populations continue to grow.

One of the main exports from the City of Wasilla and the Mat-Su Borough is labor. It is estimated that over 38 percent of the Borough's population works in Anchorage (Source: Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development). Vehicle counts in 1998 showed that over 40,000 vehicles traveled from the Mat-Su Borough each day to Anchorage. It is estimated that the Mat-Su Borough will continue to attract more people from the Anchorage Area to invest their earnings in housing, consumer goods, businesses and services located in the City of Wasilla in the up coming years. It is estimated that the total percent of Anchorage/Mat-Su Region population living in the Mat-Su Borough will increase from 18 percent in 1999 to 26 percent in 2018 (source: Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development).

The key factor to this robust migration from Anchorage to the Mat-Su Borough and the City of Wasilla is the availability of less expensive housing. According to the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, the average sales price of a single-family home in the Mat-Su Borough is nearly 23 percent below the price of an Anchorage home. Also, other factors have had an influence on homeowner's decisions to move to the Mat-Su Borough. Surveys have shown that a more rural lifestyle and the ability to live on larger sections of land are appealing to homeowners. These factors along with the State's investment in the transportation infrastructure between the Municipality of Anchorage and the Mat-Su Borough will continue to make the Borough an attractive place to live.

Another ingredient to the expansion of economic activity in the City of Wasilla and the Mat-Su Borough is the availability of developable land. It is estimated that the City of Wasilla and the Mat-Su Borough will capture more of the share of the total economic development that occurs in South Central Alaska as the amount of developable land shrinks in the Municipality of Anchorage. An example of this trend is increased number of car dealerships in the Borough that service both residents in the Borough and

Anchorage. The development of the new port facility at Point McKenzie and possibility of new projects such as a commuter railroad will help the expansion of this type of economic investment to continue in the City of Wasilla.


The tourist industry is becoming one the keystones of the City of Wasilla's economy along with the Mat-Su Borough's economy. The Mat-Su Borough has become a vacation spot for people living in the South Central Alaska. According to the Mat-Su Borough, hotel sales receipts have grown by over 600 percent since 1993 and hotel employment has increased by over 300 percent since 1990. Also, a significant number of people living outside the Mat-Su Borough own recreational property in the Borough. These people spend their weekend in the Borough spending money in the City's retails stores for food and other services. Another section of the tourist economy that is growing is the group tour section. Since the City of Wasilla is a Gateway to the Denali park system, tourist groups traveling through the City to get to the Park system are stimulating the City's economy.

Other industries that will continue to play an indirect part in the City's economy include agriculture and resource extraction. According to the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development over half of all agriculture production in Alaska is from the Mat-Su Borough. With the development of Point Mckenzie and the possibility of a Trans Alaska Gas pipeline, the resource extraction portion of our economic activity, will also continue to play an important role in the City's economy in the future years.

In summary, the future looks bright for the City of Wasilla's economy. Based on investment trends of large retail companies and the demographic trend for the Borough, the City of Wasilla will retain its position as the retail center for the Mat-Su Borough. According to estimates from the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce, the Mat-Su Borough's population could surpass 100, 000 by the Year 2018. This population trend means that the City of Wasilla could be servicing over 76,000 people by the Year 2018. Retail and service expansion will continue to dominate the City of Wasilla's economy. The City of Wasilla's economy is ultimately linked to the Mat-Su Borough's and the Municipality of Anchorage's economy. As long as the South Central's economy expands, the City of Wasilla should retain it's place as one of the strongest performing economies in the State of Alaska.

The Matanuska-Susitna Borough

A profile of the fastest-growing area in the state

conomic indicators for the Matanuska-Susitna Borough all tell the same story. employment, Population, migration, highway counts and the number of new homes being built all say that Mat-Su is the fastest growing area in the state. In fact, it is one of the few areas in the state with a robust or even booming economy. This is not the first time that the Mat-Su Borough has been in the forefront of growth in Alaska, but it is unusual that the borough is among so few areas in the state enjoying vigorous growth. And because of its standing as one of the state's few strong performers, an increasing number of developers, investors and others are eyeballing the area with interest.

The Mat-Su Borough is the third largest borough in the state both physically and by population. At 24,683 square miles it is about the same size as West Virginia. With a population of 55,694 residents, only Anchorage and the Fairbanks North Star Borough are larger or have more residents. (See Exhibit 1.) Although the borough is geographically large, nearly nine out of ten residents live along the road system between Willow and Sutton. Only three of the borough's communities are incorporated—Palmer, Wasilla and Houston—and they represent just 18 percent of its population. There are communities such as Chase and Skwentna that are off the road system but can usually be reached by snow machine, plane, boat, train or some other type of off-road vehicle. There are also communities such as Talkeetna that are on the road system but away from the most densely populated area of the borough.

Labor is a big export

Different industries have helped shaped the Mat-Su economy. Mining and agriculture were the first major economic influences. Although the Mat-Su Valley remains the state's biggest agricultural producer, other economic forces now drive the economy. For the last four decades the single biggest reason for the borough's growth has been its proximity to the state's largest city, Anchorage.








Surprisingly, growth exists in nearly every part of the Mat-Su Borough. The hottest spot is the Meadow Lakes area, where the population has more than doubled during the past decade. Meadow Lakes is a large suburban area situated between Wasilla and Houston. Even Talkeetna, which is beyond any realistic daily commute, is experiencing robust growth.

Home to a very competitive housing market

Part of the Mat-Su area's appeal is its affordable housing market. The numbers paint a compelling picture—and this has not been lost on the state's housing consumers. In 1999, the average sales e of a single family home in the Mat-Su Valley \$135,979, nearly 23 percent below an Anchorage home and significantly below the statewide average. (See Exhibit 5.) Mat-Su Borough may eventually capture a bigger hare of other economic development that occurs a Southcentral Alaska. For example, a growing number of car dealerships in Mat-Su cater to ocal residents as well as attract business from Anchorage. And in the early 1990s, GCI Communications, with headquarters in Anchorage, located a call center in the Mat-Su Valley. Another example of future growth could be the new port facility at Point McKenzie, if it attracts traffic. This kind of economic activity in the Mat-Su Borough can only increase with time.

Services and retail dominate the employment picture

Not unlike population, employment has also grown considerably faster in the Mat-Su Valley

than anywhere else in the state. (See Exhibits 7 and 8.) Since most of the growth in Mat-Su's labor force is tied to population growth, this is not surprising. During the past decade employment in the Mat-Su Borough grew 5.8% per year, three times faster than the rest of the state. Two-thirds of this growth came from retail and services. (See Exhibits 9 and 10.) Services alone represents a quarter of all wage and salary employment. (See Exhibit 11.) Most of the employment in the area provides services to the local population and is not export-related activity. Health care has been a growth industry. Business and social services are also contributors. Retail employment and sales followed a similar path of strong growth. (See Exhibit 12.) Retail got a big boost in 1999 with the opening of a new Fred Meyer store, and more recently, the new larger Wal-Mart replacement.

ne vast majority of the Mat-Su Borough's visitors be independent travelers. However, this began langing when Princess Tours opened its 238-born Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge near alkeetna in 1997. Last year Cook Inlet Region beened the Talkeetna Lodge, a 98-room hotel, usiness has been so good that the Talkeetna bodge is doubling its number of rooms this year, oth of these hotels rank among the top 25 mployers in the borough. (See Exhibit 16.) Hotel employment in the Valley has grown 77 ercent since 1995. Other smaller lodges and totels have opened and expanded. If the present rend continues, this industry will continue to liversify and grow.


Some of the traditional industries

Agriculture, once a dominant sector, is still a blayer, but its role has diminished. In 1998, the value of agricultural production in the Matanuska Valley was \$9 million, which represented more than half of all agricultural production in the state. Mining in the borough is at present limited to very small operations. In the past, major gold and coal mines operated in the region and similar operations could open again in the future.

Unemployment picture improves

During the past three years, unemployment in the Mat-Su Borough has fallen dramatically. (See Exhibit 17.) In fact, 1998's unemployment rate of 6.9% was a record low. Another positive development is the narrowing of the jobless rates between the Mat-Su Borough and Anchorage. In 1996 and earlier, it was not unusual for the borough's jobless rate to be more than twice as high as Anchorage's. Part of the explanation may be that the region's labor market is more grated than ever. The tight labor market of the past three years is another part of the reason





As a resident of Wasilla since 1989 and a parent of two children, I have watched our community grow from barely aving any of our malls and shopping centers inhabited with various stores, to many new stores and office buildings leing built. Our community is growing! However, it is not just the adult population that is growing, our youth population increasing rapidly.

My wife, Louisa, has been an active board and/or volunteer on many youth sports groups in the Mat-Su Valley, including potball, baseball, soccer, basketball, wrestling, and hockey. She and I have seen first hand how cramped our facility is and the large youth participation. It is unfortunate that we also can see the many kids and parents who are discouraged and don't participate because of our lack of facilities. This hurts our community today, and most importantly our community's future. Kids need to have a place to grow that will have a positive influence on them. We don't have to look very far to see that kids will find 'something' to do in their spare time. It should be our primary objective to provide a constructive, positive, and safe environment for the youth of our community to grow up in.

We have five high schools, four hockey associations, men's league, women's league, and figure skaters that utilize the Brett Arena. We are certainly getting full utilization out of this facility, but the truth of the matter is the Brett Arena has butlived it's effectiveness that it was designed to do for the youth of our community.

Our community would benefit greatly from a multi-purpose sports facility. This would not only benefit the youth of our community, but the entire community, regardless of age. This facility should be able to house at least one sheet of ice, basketball court, weight room, saunas, hand ball or racquetball court, meeting rooms, and have space available for stores and a restaurant. It should have comfortable seating, so parents and grandparents can come and enjoy themselves. Two good examples of facilities that could be combined into one facility in Wasilla would be the Spenard Recreation Center and the recently built Tesoro Center in Anchorage.

I really don't think this is too much to ask. Residents voted a 2% sales tax in several years back and we have seen some very positive improvements in our community as a result of it, but we have overlooked the majority of our youth in the process. We will always have a need for improved water systems, sewage systems, roads, and many other projects and programs that we utilize on a daily basis. However, we may not need to expand our police department if our youth can be more occupied with positive activities than negative ones. Let's continue to have a city we can be proud of tomorrow. A city that our children can look back on when they become adults and be proud of — one they will use as their city's model or even settle down here because of the positive influence it had on them as youth. Dear Mayor Palin, Mayor Guinotte, Mayor Lacher,

Please consider the above proposal as a request from the business community to consider building a convention/sports center in the Mat-Su Borough. This project could be a joint effort of the Borough, and the Cities of Wasilla and Palmer. We feel that a project of this sort would greatly increase the revenue of all of the above and would put in place a facility that this community needs in order to compete with the rest of the state in bidding for in state conventions that generally go to the Anchorage and Kenai/Soldotna area. Some, but not all of the reasons that a project like this is needed, and my thoughts on how a project like this could be paid for are as follows:

- 1. Decreasing Oil Revenue: The State of Alaska is projecting a decrease in oil revenue which will greatly effect funding for roads, maintenance, and general funding to each of your general expense requirements. A project like this along with the expansion of the Parks and Palmer/Wasilla Highway which when completed will greatly decrease the access problems and will inevitably invite more business to move to this area. This of course will increase your tax base and will help alleviate a decrease in funding from the State. This project should be complete by the time the Parks and Palmer/Wasilla Highway are completed, thus were looking at the year 2000.
- 2 Convention Center: This need should be obvious to all. We need to compete with the rest of the state, mainly Anchorage and Soldotna with a facility that can house up to 500 to 1000 people for the many conventions that are held each year. It is now also apparent that some nation wide companies want to hold there convention in Alaska and I would expect this trend to continue in the future.
- 3. Sporting Center: This type of faculty brings a feeling of well being to the community, besides greatly increasing the tax base during those events. The need to be a First Class Borough/Cities makes this a must for our area.
- 4. Community Performing Arts: This faculty could be used at a later date for a performing arts building so some thought about this should be considered during the planning stage. Again, facilities like this enrich the entire community and will make a difference when families are deciding whether to locate here or elsewhere.
- 5. Location: My personal view is this project should be constructed on the Palmer/Wasilla Highway and it will accomplish several things at once.
 - A. Redirect some of the business growth off of the Parks
 - B. Benefit both Cities
 - C. Centrally located for all commuters
 - D. Create a new Business Area that will grow toward Wasilla and Palmer

alike.

- 6. Highway Expansion Palmer/Wasilla: I realize that the upgrade of this highway is on the drawing boards, but this project should be completed at the same time as the Parks, In addition I believe that the upgrade of the Palmer/Wasilla and the expansion to Knik road along with this project will redirect the business growth off of the Parks. The convention center will serve as a focal point for this area; so it is important to have a coordinated effort between Wasilla and Palmer, because this project will benefit both communities. Wasilla and Palmer need to act like partners not *rivals*. The borough should oversee this project and have authority to act in the behalf of the entire community rather than interest of either Wasilla or Palmer. The Convention/Sports Center will greatly influence new businesses coming into the area, so lets build the roads now before the access problems occur and lets do it with an understanding that this will develop into a major business district growing toward Palmer and Wasilla.
- 7. Who Pays for it? It's only my opinion that the cost should be pro-rated based on current sales tax collected by both cities because it would be my assumption that once the project is completed that the cities will benefit more or less in the same ratio that the expenses were pro-rated. In short, sales taxes received from any event occurring in the Convention Center will be spread pretty much on how they are received now. The Borough should participate based on Real Estate taxes received; I'm sure a formula could be worked out and should not be the stumbling block on why this project is not done.
- 8. Chamber Participation: It may be helpful to have both chambers get involved if the cities decide to pursue this project. The Chambers could form as a single group to explore such things as location, type of facility, type of road system, and generally help in getting the community behind this project.

In closing, I realize that I've not hit all of the snags and benefits a project like this will have on a community, but I'm quite convinced that this project will have permanent benefits to this community and will create a tax base, add jobs and will improve the quality of life in the VALLEY. I thank you in advance for your consideration of the above and look forward to your thoughts on this.

Mayor Palin,

I recently visited your office today to find out more about the proposed sports complex and I just received your fax. Just so you know, I am representing the Mat-Su Softball Assoc. not the Mat-Su CVB on this issue. We support the sports complex 100% regardless of any consideration to the softball associations needs (primarily fields). This area desperately needs this facility for our youth.

I stopped by to present an idea the Mat-Su Softball board had at a recent meeting. Many of the youth sports groups lack resources and volunteer time to effectively run their organizations. We thought about forming a Mat-Su Sports Association that could include any sports organization that wished to join. We could use the revenues that we generate from charitable gaming permits, player fees, concessions and any other source to fund an office with a full time executive director/ manager who would oversee the day-to-day operation of all of the participating associations. Most associations have a 2-4 month season and finding a quality individual for temporary hire is difficult.

We don't have any details worked out. We were wondering if this idea would be a good fit with the sports complex plan.

On another note, the MSSA is very excited with the support we are currently getting from the city. The new pavilion at Bumpus will make it safe for spectators to view the games. Don and Tony have been a great help to us and we do appreciate it. We are in the process of making a long-range plan. We currently have an agreement with the borough to use and maintain the four fields at the Sherrod complex. That complex is right next to a school and the fences are only 275 feet (300 ft. is the minimum needed to host a State tournament). We feel that there may be a time in the not so distant future when those fields should be used for little league. When that is depends on if and when we can get some new fields. I know Bumpus is scheduled for more softball fields and the borough is looking at building a new complex as well. I would like to talk to you about the field issue for a few minutes when have time.

It is good to see the progress and planning efforts by the City of Wasilla's (COW) Council Members, led by your administration. It is exciting to see the Council's approval to add a Multi-Use Sport Facility (MUSF) complex to the list of projects to be considered. I would also be glad to see this facility be combined with a convention center for our business community and tourist events. I believe that the City and the Core Area will be blessed by such a project. Please give each of the Council my personal thanks.

This project is long overdue. I highly support the development of this building. To that end I have requested a resolution be prepared for the Matanuska Susitna Borough (MSB) Assembly members to ask for their support of this project. When the resolution comes forward for consideration I will let you know.

I hope that citizens will come forward and give us their thoughts on this. I am glad to see Council Members and COW Administration planning to bring a project of this size to voters first. Since benefits of such a project affect residents beyond COW's city limits, we need their support too. Perhaps the MSB could be an active participant in this project as well. A project of this size should require commitment by all taxpayers of the MSB not just those living in Wasilla City limits. Many non-Wasilla residents feel they contribute (sales tax) when they shop in Wasilla. It would be interesting to add up the taxes received by the 2% sales tax paid since enactment and compare that to the cost of this project.

This development will take pressure off school facilities as well. There will be a cost savings by not having to provide extra expense to accommodate large crowds that schools try to provide, such as sports playoffs, graduation ceremonies, and other large celebrations.

Our business community has a lot to gain with an influence a convention center can bring. It will attract new investors and new events that are usually held only in Anchorage. A lot of business is lost locally because we don't have a way at the present to accommodate groups that desire this type of facility.

Our visitors' bureau should be in support of the project. Many people will want to come to sport events and business shows. This will increase demand on hotels, motels, bed and breakfast facilities, and restaurants too.

Administration of the MSB & the cities within the borough, can view this as an economic development opportunity. Many new and bigger businesses will be encouraged to move here with this development. In the past, a lot of business was lost because we had no accommodations for large gatherings.

Location and size of this facility has not been determined through a current study. We need to be prudent and wise. To oversize would be unaffordable, to undersize more expensive in the long run. Perhaps a design that has plenty of land and a building that can be expanded as needs increase. What is important is that we build the best we can afford as we can afford it. With the right financing and money handling, the facility can not only pay for itself over time but also keep up with growth demands as well.

Please recognize that this is not an official letter from the MSB assembly body. This is a personal letter from your Assemblyman, giving you, your administration, and the Council many thanks for this project consideration and the outstanding jobs you are all doing.

Over the last few weeks we have responded to youth parties and gatherings all around the city. The Alaska State Troopers have also seen a rise in such activities. We have also seen very large crowds at Valley Billiards in Wasilla. This business started out with good intentions and assured us they would run a tight ship. It has been everything but what was promised. We see kids who want to have a good time having to deal with the drug dealers and all around delinquents. Fights are a nightly event and alcohol and drugs are often part of the activities. I recognize kids from the middle school and high school sports teams hanging out at the pool hall and Carrs parking lot. When I ask them why they are there, I already know the response, there is nothing for them to do. The sports complex would give good kids the opportunity to have safe and fun activities to pursue. I realize it is not up to the City of Wasilla to baby sit kids but I think it is our esponsibility to try and help them become responsible adults. Providing them with a complex that had sporting activities available, unlike current resources, would be an obvious impact.

My biggest concern would be the location of the complex. If it were inside the City of Wasilla we would be able to provide continuos patrol of the area. The State Troopers do not have the staffing or the time to provide proactive police protection to the complex. Without that kind of police presence, there would be no real deterrent for the criminal element. To put the complex anywhere outside of the city would leave the families and the complex virtually unprotected. The Wasilla City Council has shown great support for public safety and for the youth of the city. By building a sports complex in the City of Wasilla, they could provide families with a safe area for recreation and give it the protection necessary to keep it that way. With your proactive response to the communities needs and the support the council has shown, the sports complex could be the best thing to happen for the city and borough in years. It has come to my attention that there are very few appropriate emergency shelter locations within the City of Wasilla. Currently the American Red Cross has only one signed shelter agreement within the city limits. That shelter agreement is with the Wasilla Senior Center. The Senior Center is a desirable location because it has open floor space, showers, and an excellent kitchen facility. The only problem with it is its size and its ability to manage a large group of people during an emergency evacuation. We are currently negotiating with the Matanuska Susitna Borough School District to develop a shelter agreement with them, but at this time, it has not been finalized.

It would be ideal to have a large capacity building within the city limits. In the event of a major disaster, Red Cross would then have space large enough to manage a mass evacuation, keeping families and loved ones together. A multi-use sports complex would serve as an excellent facility for such an emergency. I support your effort in bringing such a complex to Wasilla.
