**SUMMARY STATEMENT:** Alaska State Grant in Aid award in the amount of \$7000 has been awarded to the Dorothy Page Museum. This award will provide training for the Museum Registrar in exhibit development and implementation. A portion of funds will be used to cover transportation and lodging costs. The remaining funds will be used to create a new permanent exhibit demonstrating the development of Wasilla. The new exhibit will focus on the historical transition between the two towns and identify key figures in the development of these towns. These improvements will enhance patrons' appreciation of the connections and nuances between people and place in the Matanuska Valley, and how these local developments were linked to the larger historical forces at work in Alaska.
