SUMMARY STATEMENT: Alaska State Grant in Aid award in the amount of \$7000 has been awarded to the Dorothy Page Museum. This award will provide training for the Museum Registrar in exhibit development and implementation. A portion of funds will be used to cover transportation and lodging costs. The remaining funds will be used to create a new permanent exhibit demonstrating the development of Wasilla.
